JULY - DECEMBER, 2022

Monthly Meetings: We returned to the Central Park Arsenal for in-person meetings after 2 ½ years. These speakers delivered excellent talks at the Arsenal with members happy to catch up in person with fellow members.

Field Trips:

Four field trips were held since July 1st:

- July 21 Brooklyn Bridge Park Our outing to BBP was bittersweet as it was also a farewell to long-time MH Board member Rebecca McMackin prior to beginning her Loeb Fellowship with the Harvard Graduate School of Design. Thirty members explored Pier 3, one of her favorite areas. We were able to see how her focus on ecological landscape practices have been rigorously applied to transform the Brooklyn waterfront into a teaming habitat for birds, butterflies, pollinators and other wildlife. The evening ended with a festive celebration for Rebecca's send off at Fornino's (Pier 6) who provided a beautiful rooftop setting with complimentary drinks and food.
- August 5 Domino Park Summer Social Our summer social turned out to be a terrific 2-for-1 special! Nathan Bartholomew (Director of Horticulture at Two Trees Management Company) added an insiders' tour of the 5-acre Domino Park, in addition to providing complimentary snacks for our happy hour. Nathan walked us through this recently created park located on the site of the former Domino Sugar Refinery (East River waterfront). He provided history on the project, including details on the complexity of designing/engineering the infrastructure. The integration of salvaged equipment reminds the visitor of the historical industrial use of the site as a major sugar refining facility. The park is brimming with activity and is clearly embraced by the surrounding community.







• <u>August 23 - The Farm at Javits Center</u> After navigating a maze of elevators and service corridors, our group of over 30 members reached the state-of-the-art urban farm on top of the Javits Center. The Farm spans 1 acre of

vegetable growing beds including a 3,500 ft² climate-controlled greenhouse and a 10,000 ft² rooftop orchard. The operation began in 2021 and is managed by Brooklyn Grange Rooftop Farm (BK Grange). Co-founder and CEO of BK Grange, Ben Flanner and team provided an overview of their approach to farming, including crop selection/rotation, soil selection/maintenance, irrigation systems use/maintenance, etc. We also learned about many of the design and infrastructure considerations that enabled the development of the farm, including the rainwater collections system. We enjoyed the breath-taking river views from the east side of the Farm where the apple and pear orchard and "mobile gardens" of 100 movable planters are situated.



• <u>September 29 - Governors Island</u> Following a brief ferry excursion from southern Manhattan, Andi Pettis and four of her knowledgeable and enthusiastic staff hosted ~ 30 members to an early fall walking tour. We heard of the many challenges faced by the horticultural staff including the hosting of massive events on the Island, the topography (steep slopes) of the 3 hills, and the highly exposed location. We also learned about various approaches to control of invasive species and were shown successful examples of the use of solarization. From the

hills to the protected "woodsy" areas to enjoying Slide Hill with its 3 slides, a good time was had by all. And, the expansive views of the Statue of Liberty, Manhattan and Jersey City skylines are always awesome!



Workshops: Two workshops were held since July 1st:

July 18th - Community Composting at Queensbridge Community Compost Site, hosted by Devin Reitsma, Project
Manager for NYC's Big Reuse Community Compost Project. We learned about the programming of the NYC
Compost Project, industrial composting in an urban setting, and the benefits of compost application for
horticulture. We then toured the Dutch Kills Green, a unique lush green park built right in the busy intersection of
Queens Plaza North and Queensboro Bridge.



MHG Board: We are happy to welcome 5 new board members whose terms begin in 2023:

- Rowan Blaik is Vice President of Horticulture at Brooklyn Botanic Garden. He has overseen the Garden's grounds, glasshouses, and collections in this role since 2021. He joined BBG in 2017 as Director of Living Collections, became Associate VP of Horticulture and Living Collections in 2019, and Acting VP of Horticulture from 2020. Prior to BBG, Rowan was head gardener for eight years at Down House, the former home of Charles Darwin. He managed the garden through the Darwin bicentenary. In the U.K., Rowan worked and trained with the Royal Parks; the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew; and English Heritage. He holds a Master of Research from UCL, London, and a Diploma in Horticulture from RBG, Kew.
- Richard Hayden is the director of horticulture for The High Line. He previously served as assistant deputy director of the Los Angeles Natural History Museum where he oversaw the *Nature Gardens* and collaborated with scientists in their study of urban nature. He also served as the project manager for La Brea Tar Pits Museum's new master plan. He began his 25-year career in horticulture as a Los Angeles-based landscape designer, recently served as the board chair for Pacific Horticulture and previously as the President of the Los Angeles District of the Association of Professional Landscape Designers.



- Shanti Nagel is the founder of Design Wild, a landscape design firm working at the intersection of climate, people, and collective well-being. She founded an organic vegetable farm at the age of 20 and after years in operation, she moved from rural agriculture to urban agriculture managing one of New York City's largest urban farms. She is a graduate of NYBG's School of Professional Horticulture, a trained horticulturist and skilled landscape designer. She comes from a long line of social activism and approaches all her work through a lens of equity and justice. For the last decade, Shanti and Design Wild have been creating naturally ferocious, beautiful, and incredibly durable gardens in extreme urban environments, public spaces, affordable houses, as well as private residences in NYC and the Hudson Valley.
- Richard Martin Smith, a University of Florida alum and Certified Horticulture Professional, has worked in the horticulture
 education field for over a decade, including experience with secondary, post-secondary, adult and professional learners. As the
 Director for the School of Professional Horticulture at NYBG, Richard is excited to expand on the many initiatives already taking

 consultant, and lead teacher for a public-school horticultural sciences program. Richard's goals are to develop a broader reach
