FIELD TRIPS:

Two field trips were held since July 1st: July 18 – Oko Farms, Brooklyn

Founder and Director Yemi Amu and her team hosted 35 members at the largest outdoor aquaponics farm in NYC located on the Brooklyn waterfront. Yemi demonstrated several types of aquaponic systems and explained how they leverage the symbiotic relationship between the cultivation of plants and fish. We strolled the "fields" and enjoyed the wide variety of vegetables, herbs, fruits, medicinal plants and flowers. Yemi also provided an overview of Oko Farms' wide array of programs, including education, community outreach and design/build projects.



September 28 – Green-Wood Cemetery

Twenty-eight members braved the weather and were treated to an educational and inspiring presentation by Joe Charap, V.P. of Horticulture (and new MHB Board Member!), and Sara Evans, Senior Manager of Living Collections and Curator. We saw several locations around the 478-acre cemetery, visiting recently established meadows, and trial areas with evaluations of plants/seed mixes. Joe and Sara briefed us on other initiatives including reductions in the use of herbicides, carbon emissions reductions through reduced mowing, a wood-waste program where they share wood chips with many organizations and a stormwater program that utilizes the cemetery's lake and helps to refill underground storage caverns.

Metro Hort Group hosted its first Mixer at Urban Space in Union Square. Attendees enjoyed food and drink from 12 restaurants in a fun and casual atmosphere. It was a great opportunity to catch up with friends and other industry members. Stay tuned for more Mixers in 2024!

TMHG BOARD: We're GROWING! We are happy to welcome 7 new board members whose 3-year terms begin in 2024.

- Joseph Charap is Vice-President of Horticulture at The Green-Wood Cemetery, in Brooklyn, N.Y. He is responsible for the leadership, oversight, and guidance of all horticulture operations at the National Historic Landmark, and the development of its living collection. He joined Green-Wood in 2014 as an intern, became Curator of Plant Collections in 2015, Director of Horticulture in 2016, and Vice-President in 2022. He is a member of the Executive Committee of the Urban Forestry Council, Chair of *Public Garden Magazine*'s Editorial Advisory Group, and a member of the Leadership Team of Forest for All NYC. He is a graduate of the New York Botanical Garden's School of Professional Horticulture and holds a Masters in English Literature from Brooklyn College.
- Ben Flanner is co-founder and CEO of Brooklyn Grange, a rooftop farm, sustainable events venue, and landscape design, build and maintenance company based in NYC. He is recognized as a pioneer for his groundbreaking model, which adapts established green roof technology to support intensive agriculture. Ben has shared his unwavering commitment to develop the urban farming industry and focus on growing an exceptionally green and community-minded business with audiences and consulting clients across the globe. Prior to founding Brooklyn Grange in 2010, Ben worked briefly in management consulting and marketing before pursuing farming. He has a degree in Industrial Engineering from the University of Wisconsin.
- Duncan Himmelman recently retired from Mt. Cuba Center (Delaware) as the Education Manager wherein he was responsible for the development and delivery of all adult education programs, including their signature *Certificate in Ecological Gardening*. Prior to that he was the Program Manager for Continuing Education at NYBG, responsible for the development and delivery of all certificate and non-certificate offerings. Duncan spent 24 years teaching Horticultural Science at both colleges and universities in Canada and the United States. He holds an undergraduate degree in Botany from Hobart College and a Ph.D. in Horticultural Science from Cornell University.
- Matthew Morrow is the Director of Horticulture in the NYC Park's Division of Environment & Planning. Since 2019, Matthew has overseen several horticulture programs within the agency and is at the forefront of moving agency horticulture operations in an ecological direction. Matthew is a lifelong gardener, having worked professionally for 20 years as a landscaper, gardener, propagator, greenhouse manager, and operations manager for a number of private, non-profit, and public institutions in NYC and other states. Matthew studied fine art at Pratt, and seeks to blend the worlds of art, poetry, philosophy and science into horticulture.
- A Brooklyn native, **Rashid Poulson** is the Director of Horticulture at Brooklyn Bridge Park Corporation. Rashid's career in horticulture began as a Million Trees Training Program alumnus, where he studied and practiced arboriculture, urban landscape design, and ecological restoration. His current role as director focuses on the management, training, and development of the Horticulture staff and spreading the lore of the Park's horticulture through tours, presentations, and community engagement. Additionally, he manages and experiments with the Pier 5 Uplands Berm allowing him to maintain a connection with his staff, the community and the landscape he has been connected to for over a decade.
- As Managing Partner of international landscape practice Martha Schwartz Partners, **Kimberly Tryba** manages the strategic planning and global business development efforts for the firm's three offices in New York, London and Shanghai. Active in ASLA since 2012, she's a board member of ASLA-NY and chairs its Advocacy Committee. Kimberly co-chaired the 2021 and 2022 NJASLA annual meetings, and was a committee member since 2014. Kimberly also sits on the board of NYSCLA and the Steering Committee of the PDC's Designing New York: Streetscapes.
